Parish Pastoral Plan 2026 - 2028

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The parish is not an outdated institution; precisely because it possesses great flexibility, it can assume quite different contours depending on the openness and missionary creativity of the pastor and the community. While certainly not the only institution which evangelizes, if the parish proves capable of self-renewal and constant adaptivity, it continues to be 'the Church living in the midst of the homes of her sons and daughters.' This presumes that it really is in contact with the homes and the lives of its people and does not become a useless structure out of touch with people or a self-absorbed group made up of a chosen few. The parish is the presence of the Church in a given territory, an environment for hearing God's word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship, and celebration. In all its activities, the parish encourages and trains its members to be evangelizers. It is a community of communities, a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey, and a center of constant missionary outreach.

What is a Parish Pastoral Council?

A Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is a group within a parish that collaborates with the parish priest to foster spiritual growth and support the mission of the church. The council typically consists of parishioners chosen by the community, and its main functions include pastoral planning, promoting dialogue, and ensuring the parish's activities align with its mission.

In 1971, it became mandatory for each parish in the Diocese of Auckland to have a Parish Pastoral Council. The Parish Pastoral Council is not a body of representatives but a representative body whose primary function is to set the vision and plan to make "the life and activity of the parish ever more closely conform to the gospel." Their focus is on the pastoral aspect of the parish (see Appendix A).

The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) consists of the Parish Priest and a team of parishioners chosen by the parish community. The Councillors work collaboratively to build a vital Christian community in which parishioners' spiritual growth is fostered and their baptismal calls to mission are discerned and supported (see Appendix B).

Our Parish Community

Rooted in a rich historical tradition, the East Coast Bays Catholic Parish encompasses two churches: St. Francis de Sales in Torbay and St. John the Baptist in Mairangi Bay. These churches serve as welcoming spaces where faith is nurtured, community bonds are strengthened, and parish life continues to flourish. Both play a vital role in the life of the parish, offering liturgical celebrations, sacramental programs, and pastoral initiatives to meet the spiritual needs of the local community.

Operating under one pastoral leadership, the two churches share a unified vision of fostering a vibrant, faith-filled, and inclusive Catholic community—committed to worship, service, and evangelisation.

Throughout the year, East Coast Bays Parish has continued to offer a wide range of programs and initiatives that encourage engagement across all age groups. From children's and youth ministries to adult faith formation, hospitality, and prayer groups, the parish remains a place where individuals and families can grow in faith, find connection, and contribute meaningfully to the mission of the Church.

Our Mission

Our Parish – Core Working Committees

ECB Parish Pastoral Council

The East Coast Bays Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) was established in 2018 to support the pastoral and spiritual growth of the parish community. The current council is a representative body made up of the parish priest, assistant priest, and parishioners, each overseeing key portfolios with the support of sub-committees. Meeting monthly, the PPC works collaboratively with the Parish Priest to drive the parish vision by planning pastoral activities and ensuring that parish life aligns more closely with the Gospel.

The PPC shares responsibility with the Parish Priest for the spiritual and pastoral care of the community. Its mission is to serve Christ by fostering faith, encouraging service, and strengthening the sense of belonging and community within the parish.

Finance Committee

The Parish Finance Committee has been assisting the parish priest for many years, supporting the Church's mission through sound financial stewardship and the effective management of parish financial affairs.

The committee ensures accountability and provides advice and support to the parish priest in the following areas:

- Resourcing: Ensuring the parish has the financial capacity to maintain assets, facilities, and provide financial support for pastoral initiatives.
- Planning and Budgeting: Developing, monitoring, and overseeing financial plans and budgets.
- Accounting: Administering parish income, ensuring accurate record-keeping, and safeguarding parish financial resources.

ECB Parish Pastoral Council and Finance Committee

Councillors are nominated from members of the parish community by the members of the community during the Annual General Meeting & Finance Committee Members are appointed by the Parish Priest. Each term of office is three years, with a maximum total term of six years. Succession planning will be reviewed every three years to ensure a mix of existing and new members on the Council.

Key areas of responsibility managed by the Parish Pastoral Council & Finance Committee

- Since inception considerable work has been undertaken by Parish Councillors and Finance Committee members to assist in understanding the past, embracing the present, and setting the platform for the future – parish, pastoral and financial. Work has been undertaken in the following areas:
- Understanding existing structure, operations, costs and legacy issues.
- Identifying and working through maintenance issues.
- Upgrading Parish office layout, IT and furniture.
- Reviewing communication tools and databases to allow a greater variety of communication methods.
- Maintaining pastoral care and liturgical celebrations.
- Establish 3 paid roles of Operations & Finance Manager, Liturgy and Pastoral Coordinator & Office and Communications Assistant.
- Continuing to build community through events and celebrations.
- Identifying and planning for building upgrades.
- Developing a Parish Pastoral Strategic Plan to assist the growth and development of our parish community and set the platform for the future of the parish.

Tasks performed by Volunteers

In living out our mission as a vibrant and faith-filled community, our parish offers a wide range of ministries that provide meaningful opportunities for all members to actively participate in parish life. Focus from Pope Francis

Terms of Reference for Parish Councils and Finance Committees

The 1983 Code of Canon Law provides that:

In all juridical matters, the Parish Priest acts in the person of the Parish, in accordance with the law. He is to ensure that the Parish goods are administered in accordance with Canons 1281 - 1299. [Canon 532]

In each Parish there is to be a Finance Committee to help the Parish Priest in the administration of the goods of the Parish, without prejudice to Canon 532. It is ruled by the universal law and by the norms laid down by the Diocesan Bishop, and it is composed of members of the faithful selected according to these norms. [Canon 537]

Finance Committees are mandatory in every Parish, as are Parish Pastoral Councils. Strong communication and co-operation between these two groups will be an effective means of combining the pastoral and financial aspects of the entire Parish. A member of the Parish Finance Committee should either (a) be a member of the Parish Council or (b) liaise closely with the Parish Council.

The Finance Committee is primarily concerned with helping the Parish Priest or Administrator in fulfilling the Church's Mission in terms of:

Resourcing: To ensure that the Parish has the financial capacity both for the provision of assets and facilities (such as church, presbytery, hall etc.) and for the financial support for those involved in Pastoral works, i.e. The Parish Priest, his Staff, Parish pastoral assistants etc.

Planning: To plan, in a systematic way, both for the provision of this resourcing and its budgetary management.

Accounting, Administering & Safeguarding: To account for, administer and safeguard all Parish income, expenditure and assets.

Parish Pastoral Council Guidelines 2024

The **Parish Pastoral Council** is not a body of representatives but a representative body. Its primary function is to set the vision and plan to make “the life and activity of the parish ever more closely conform to the gospel.”¹ The focus is on the pastoral aspect of the parish.

The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) consists of the Parish Priest and a team of parishioners chosen by the parish community. The Councillors work collaboratively² to build a vital Christian community in which parishioners’ spiritual growth is fostered and their baptismal calls to mission are discerned and supported. The purpose of the PPC is to enrich the quality of parish life and provide opportunities for parishioners to:

- proclaim the good news of God’s love throughout the world
- invite more people into the community of disciples
- encourage the whole community to grow in holiness
- transform the world until the justice, peace and love of God’s reign prevail.

The PPC is a consultative body convened by the Parish Priest, which:

- prayerfully discerns parish needs
- sets pastoral priorities
- empowers people to participate in the mission of Christ
- encourages and invites parishioners to take pastoral roles in the parish.

It is not intended to be a management team for the parish. It builds up the pastoral and spiritual vitality of the parish in a way that takes account of diocesan priorities.

It will be the function of this council to investigate and consider matters relating to pastoral activity and to formulate practical conclusions regarding them.³
